### What is the SNAP Partnership?

The SNAP Partnership is a network of 53 community and faith-based organizations working on SNAP outreach and/or application assistance and committed to using a holistic approach to address hunger

### Who can join the SNAP Partnership?

Non-profit organizations (faith-based, food banks, health centers and more) or government agencies working in the community on SNAP outreach and/or application assistance

## HOW IS THE PARTNERSHIP FUNDED?

Partners receive reimbursement for **40%** of expenses on allowable SNAP activities.

### Some allowable activities include:

- SNAP eligibility pre-screening
- SNAP application assistance
- Outreach activities and eligibility information dissemination for SNAP
- Developing printed materials to provide information to clients

### Some allowable administrative costs include:

- Salaries and benefits of personnel involved
- Office supplies, postage, and travel necessary to carry our project goals
- Space lease or rental costs
